

Tourists used to have so much luggage!! Before had different outfits for dinner etc. Now amount of luggage ↓

This week local historian Ip Ling Fung published 'Fauna of Hong Kong 1850-1945'. I was interested to read that there was still tiger hunting going on in Hong Kong in the first half of the 20th C. This photo is of an American tourist, Mr. Edgar Derby, who shot this tiger in Lung Yeuk Tau, near Fanling in 1923.

This incident apparently became so famous that lots of tourists from North America used to come to Hong Kong in the 1920s to go tiger hunting in the New Territories, thousand




the 1920s to go tiger hunting in the New Territories, though none were as 'successful' as Mr. Derby. And we worry about wild boars!




